Training Requirements for Staffordshire Foster Carers

It is a requirement that all Foster Carers should evidence their training and learning at the level and frequency that is agreed within their Personal Development Plan (PDP).

Personal Development Plans

All Foster Carers will have a Personal Development Plan (PDP), which the Foster Carer and their Social Worker will agree. The PDP will be reviewed during supervision visits and updated in preparation for the Foster Carer's annual review. Each Foster Carer will have a PDP based on their approval status, individual learning, support and development needs.

This plan should agree how the Foster Carer will meet the Induction, TSD Standards, Level One and Two training requirements. The plan will identify appropriate training programmes and learning and developmental activities and include timescales for completion.

Development Activity

All Foster Carers will be required to undertake no less than 21 hours development activity per year.

This will be reviewed within Foster Carer's supervision and considered at their annual review. The Fostering Service offers a range of opportunities for learning such as training events, support groups, guided individual learning and e-learning. There are many other ways that Foster Carers can enhance their knowledge and skills, for example guided reading, accessing government internet sites and attending talks or briefings held in schools or activity clubs. These are just some examples of how all Foster Carers can meet the requirements.

Foster Carers who wish to progress through the Payment for Skills scheme will have to fulfil enhanced facilitated training event requirements as set out in the Payment for Skills policy.

Training, Support and Development Framework

The training programme and activities have been developed to support the **Training**, **Support and Development Standards for Foster Care** (referred to in this catalogue as the TSD Standards).

The TSD Standards support the Training Framework for Foster Care which sets out the training and development pathways for Foster Carers at different stages of their fostering careers: Pre-approval, Induction and Foster Carer Development.

Training, Support and Development Standards for Foster Care

The Training, Support and Development (TSD) Standards provide a national minimum benchmark that sets out what all Foster Carers should know, understand and be able to do within the first 12 months of approval. For Family and Friends Carers this induction period is extended to 18 months.

The TSD Standards are designed to:

- Ensure that all Foster Carers receive relevant induction, training, support and continuing professional development.
- Assist Managers and Supervisors in assessing the skills, knowledge and experience of Foster Carers, and in identifying their training and development needs.

Foster Carers are required to demonstrate their competence in 7 key areas that will enable them to provide quality care to children in care.

- **Standard 1**: Understand the principles and values essential for fostering children and young people.
- **Standard 2:** Understand your role as a Foster Carer.
- **Standard 3:** Understand health and safety and healthy care.
- **Standard 4:** Know how to communicate effectively.
- Standard 5: Understand the development of children and young people .
- Standard 6: Safeguard children and young people.
- Standard 7: Develop yourself.

Who has to complete the TSD Standards?

All Foster Carers are expected to complete the TSD Standards within 12 months of their approval. Variations to this are outlined below.

Short Break Carers for children and young people with a disability: There are separate TSD Standards for this group of Carers that are relevant only to Carers offering short breaks for children and young people who have a disability or complex health needs.

All portfolios are to be completed jointly and you are provided with workbooks and resources to support you to complete them. There are support groups running on Microsoft Teams should you require additional help to complete them.

The Certificate of Successful Completion

The Certificate of Successful Completion will be awarded by the Fostering Service when the Foster Carer has submitted a completed portfolio of evidence. The portfolio should show they have achieved the required skills and knowledge following their 12 month induction into fostering (18 months for Family an Friends Carers). This Certificate whilst not a qualification, will be recognised within the children's workforce and is an award which is transferrable and accepted by all Fostering Agencies.

The Fostering Mentor Programme

We aim to provide all newly approved Foster Carers with a Mentor. Mentors will be identified during the Assessment period and will support new applicants up until their first annual review.

We would encourage all experienced Foster Carers to discuss undertaking this programme with their Fostering Social Worker.

We will also look to provide a bespoke Mentor when Foster Carers need specific support and / or advice. For example - moving a child on to adoption for the first time, caring for a child with Foetal Alcohol Syndrome, caring for an unaccompanied asylum seeker, having a parent and child placement, etc.

The Training and Development Framework

The development and training events and activities that are offered to Staffordshire Foster Carers should be completed as a four stage programme. All Foster Carers will be expected to progress through the four stages which consist of:

- 1. Introduction to Fostering
- 2. Foundations to Fostering
- 3. Training, Support & Development (TSD) Standards
- 4. Continuous Professional Development including Specialist Courses

Training Activities and Events

Induction / Introduction Training

Introduction to Fostering

A mandatory workshop for all applicants to be completed after a successful Initial Visit. Also to be attended by Foster Carers transferring from other Agencies/Authorities and Family and Friends Carers.

Applicants will be provided with information on how to access the Foster Carers Handbook and resources for the Foundations to Fostering.

The Focus is to provide information, including:

- What we expect from our Foster Carers
- Achieving your TSD standards
- Your Learning Assessment Pathway
- Who are the children

Members of the Fostering Service will be available to answer any questions.

Foundations to Fostering (pre-approval)

- Mandatory for all new applicants and runs concurrently with the assessment process
- Transferring Foster Carers will identify with their assessing Social Worker which of the courses they need to attend and complete as required before panel, if not by the first review.
- Foster Carers can access a refresher as identified in their individual PDP.
- Run on a 6 week rolling programme including evening and weekend training
- Nine course subjects Each one is a stand alone course
- Applicants with prior experience of working with children and young people in the areas covered by one or more of the core training modules may be exempt from that module. This will be agreed within the Foster Carer's personal development plan. For example, it would not be necessary for someone with a current paediatric First Aid certificate to complete First Aid. The PDP will identify how the areas covered by the modules of the core training programme will be met by the Foster Carer.

Next Steps (post-approval training)

The Foundations to Fostering post-approval training should be completed within the first 18 months of Fostering as detailed in your Personal Development Plan.

- Completing & Maintaining your Portfolio TSD Standards Support
- Contextual Safeguarding (Mandatory for Carers caring for children aged 10+)
- Delegated Authority (Mandatory for all Carers)
- Let's Get Them There
- Moving Children onto Adoption (Mandatory for Carers caring for children under 5)
- Valuing Diversity & Promoting Equality (Mandatory for all Carers)
- Working with Education (Mandatory for Carers of children in education)

Continuous Professional Development Including Specialist Courses

Continuous Professional Development courses can be accessed after completion of the Foundations to Fostering or as identified in the Personal Development Plan.

Courses should meet the Foster Carers developmental needs taking into account the preferred age range and any areas of special interest.

Specialist courses meet the specific needs of a small cohort of carers but may also be accessed in the same way as the Continuous Professional Development Courses to give greater understanding and awareness.

Booking and Confirming Your Place on a Course

Non attendance at training—Cancellation Policy

Due to high numbers of Carers wanting to attend training some courses have a waiting list. Often we will try to put on a second course to accommodate numbers. It is then very disappointing when only 50% turn up. Non attendance is preventing other Carers who may need the training from being able to attend and is also costing the Training (Engagement) Team money when having to book additional venues, materials and trainer costs etc.

If you are not able to attend please let us know as soon as you are aware.

Our **Cancellation Policy** for non attendance at training without notice could result in a charge of £50 per person (for First Aid this will be £75 per person)

Training Costs for non Staffordshire County Council Carers

Subject to availability, places on courses may be purchased with prior agreement for Carers not approved by Staffordshire County Council.

- Family and Friends Carers living in Staffordshire with a child from another Local Authority.
 (Funding request from the placing LA).
- Foster Carers approved by an Independent Fostering Agency but caring for a Staffordshire Child (Funding request from the IFA).
- Adopters who were not approved by Staffordshire and not caring for a Staffordshire Child.
 (Funding request from the placing LA–first 3 years)
- Special Guardians not caring for a Staffordshire Child (Funding request from the placing LA
 –first 3 years)

Workshops delivered by the Fostering Central Engagement Team and our Partners Incur a cost of £50 per person per day which includes training, materials and refreshments.

This is with the exception of our Evidence Based Interventions Training, Prosper, Prosper + which cost £500 per person per course, and NED—Nurturing Early Development which costs £100 per person per course.

For courses delivered by external providers prices can be calculated on request.

Kids Foster 2 Activity Days

Identity & Life Experiences

Who's it for?

Mandatory for all new applicants. Family and Friends Foster Carers, and adoptive parents. Can be accessed by approved Foster Carers when identified in the Personal Development Plan.

What's it about?

- To explore some of the experiences of children and young people who are separated from their families, and to examine the impact that this has upon their self-esteem.
- To understand why it is important for Foster Carers to promote a secure sense of identity in children and young people.
- To look at the impact of prejudice and unfair discrimination upon children and young people's experiences and chances in life.

What will I learn?

- To learn about some of the essential ideas relating to diversity.
- That all children and young people have a history and it is important for them to build a positive sense of identity. Foster Carers can help by nurturing and encouraging the child to develop their sense of worth and their often fragile self esteem.
- Children and young people's heritage is a combination of their language, culture, talents, religion and ethnicity. These factors contribute greatly to their sense of identity.
- Foster Carers can play a vital role in helping children and young people value and preserve their heritage.
- Children and young people may suffer unfair discrimination, either because they are fostered or due to different aspects of their identity. Foster Carers are instrumental in acting as advocates for them. To learn that children and young people who are separated from their birth families need Foster Carers, who can provide them with a 'secure base'.

You will learn through discussion, group work and experiential learning.

Delegated Authority

Who's it for?

Valuing Diversity and Promoting Equality

Who's it for?

I grew up in a children's home in Hertfordshire and was later permanently fostered by 2 white sisters at the age of 12. As a result of this I have made 2 films about my experiences which I use as part of my training."

Working with Education

Who's it for?

This course is a vital 'one stop' workshop to help Foster Carers to actively support the education of Looked after Children in all educational settings.

The Course will discuss the e PEP system and to work in partnership with teachers and other professionals in nursery and early years settings, "statutory school" age settings, and post-16 schools and colleges.

In addition, Carers will be able to see what barriers there have been to learning in the past and what educational support they could give to any child placed.

What will I learn?

The course will cover:

- What impact on learning early trauma and attachment may actually "look like" in a nursery, early years, statutory school age or post-16 school or college.
- The role of the "Designated Teacher" for "Looked After and previously Looked After Children".
- The PEP (pupil education plan) what it is, who attends meetings, preparing for PEP meetings, your role in the PEP meeting, and how often PEP meetings are held for different age groups in different settings.
- Transitions: the impact, and handy hints to support positive transitions
- Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP's) what these are, and how applications for EHCP's are made
- Pupil Premium +: what it is, how much do nurseries and schools receive, how to apply for additional amounts.

Chimp Paradox

Who's it for?

All Foster Carers/Family and Friends Carers and Supervising Social Workers.

What's it about?

The course is based on the work of Professor Steve Peters, who was a consultant Psychiatrist at Rampton before working as a Sports Psychologist for British Cycling, Liverpool football club and England Football team. The course is based on his understanding of brain development and psychology, using a simple concept of the chimp, the human and the computer to describe the relationship between parts of the brain.

The Chimp Paradox appears in the Flourish positive psychology course. Carers used the books and practiced it with their children and within a couple of weeks, the Stability & Sufficiency Team (previously WRAP) workers were working with children describing their feelings in 'Chimp Paradox' terminology. Carers requested the course in their feedback.

The course goes through all the key concepts within the Chimp Paradox books.





The Impact of Sibling Separation

Who's it for?

Prospective Foster Carers, newly approved Foster Carers, existing Foster Carers when identified as part of the Personal Development plan, Family and Friends Foster Carers, and Adopters.

5 siblings. 5 separate homes. 5 lives torn apart by the life choices and decisions of adults around them. 5 lives punished for the actions of others. This workshop is emotive, honest, and thought-provoking. You will leave encouraged to do as much as possible to keep siblings together. No one expects to keep 5 siblings together but no one should expect 5 siblings to be placed in 5 separate homes. What could've been done differently? That will be answered. 2 of those 5 siblings are coming together for a workshop which will deal with the challenges, added trauma and emotional worry when siblings are separated. These are real experiences. Real emotions. Real children.

What will I Learn?

- To have an understanding as to how sibling separation impacts children individually
- To have an understanding as to how sibling separation can damage sibling relationships in later life
- To have an understanding as to why children are separated from siblings
- To have an understanding as to why children from sibling groups may find it difficult to 'let go'
- Provide you with an insight into the impact that the separation from my siblings had on me and them
- Provide tools to continue the relationships of children when they're separated from siblings
- Provide an insight into how our relationships are now and what we've had to do to improve our relationships
- To encourage hope that even when separation occurs, if it is when handled sensitively and positively, children can maintain and rebuild relationships with siblings

Therapeutic Parenting

Who's it for?

Anyone who has completed Attachment Part 2 and /or as agreed in the PDP.

What's it about?

This is a training course based upon a shortened version of Kim Golding's work on 'Nurturing Attachments'

The Course covers how Attachment theory relates to Therapeutic parenting, emotional regulation, the House model of parenting, and parenting with PACE (Playfulness, Acceptance, Curiosity and Empathy). The course will also cover elements of Dan Hughes' work in combining what we know about Neuroscience and Attachment Theory.

What will I learn?

Practical ways in which to promote children's security and resilience. Give an understanding of the impact of trauma on the lives of children and how we can enable children to feel safe.

Therapeutic Parenting with PACE—NEW

Who's it for?

Foster Carers, Family and Friends Carers, Special Guardians and Adopters

What's it About?

A more in depth look at the Dan Hughes approach to DDP Therapeutic Parenting

What will I Learn?

The training provides an accessible overview of the core concepts of developmental trauma, trauma-informed therapeutic care, and self-care for carers. It builds upon the learning from the two day 'Therapeutic Parenting' training we already do. The underpinning model is Dyadic Developmental Practice (DDP), an approach which allows carers to get beyond the defences and blocked trust of children in their care by developing an attitude of Playfulness, Acceptance, Curiosity and Empathy (PACE). By helping participants understand and respond to the impact of developmental trauma on children, the resource aims to help reduce the spiral of failed relationships suffered by many young people who have been removed from their birth families.

The training resource is presented as a 12 session programme and is supported with video clips, skills exercises and reading materials to support each area covered.

Through the Kids Eyes

Who is it for?

Foster Carers, Family and Friends Carers and Social Workers.

What is it about?

- Identity and why its important.
- Behaviours of young people and looking at the problem rather than the symptoms.
- Why as a Carer is reflection important.
- How the language and words we use have an impact on young people

 positive and negative.
- Why are thoughts and feelings so important.
- What values and skills do we hope young people will have by the time they leave care to live independently.
- The transition of moving on.

What will I learn?

You will have an understanding of what its like for a young person to grow up in Care and gain an understanding of the difficulties that young people face outside their 'Care' environment.

Why do young people do the things they do. There is always a reason behind what they do.

You will learn that some young people may not be ready to leave care even though they say that they are.

Understand the key issues surrounding young people in leaving Care.

'Through the Kids Eyes' is interactive training which incorporates videos, drawing and listening to audio and is designed to take Carers and SW's on a journey for what it is like for a young person going through the care system.

The training is delivered through the eyes of a Care Leaver Nick Barwick who left his foster placement in October 2014 after 9 years in place.

Trans* Awareness

Who's it for?

Aimed at Foster Carers, Family & Friends Carers and Social Workers.

What's it about?

Trans is an umbrella term that is used when describing gender identity. In today's society young people are exploring their gender identity and require the support of their friends and family in this area.

This workshop will provide discussions on the differences between gender and sexuality. It will also explore medical, physical, emotional, and social changes that a young person may go through.

Throughout this workshop we will explore how you can support your young person and also how you can support one another.

This will include appropriate language and terminology. You will be encouraged to ask any questions throughout the workshop. You will be provided with practical tips such as talking to schools and clubs. It will also look at supporting a young person experiencing gender dysphoria and how that is different from body dysmorphia.

NHS and other guidelines or legislation will be discussed.

This course will be co facilitated with a representative of SAGE (Sexuality and Gender Empowerment) a Staffordshire based charity that supports the LGBTQ+ communities in Staffordshire including Stoke and surrounding areas.

Understanding & Dealing with Secondary Trauma

Who's it for?

Prospective Foster Carers, newly approved Foster Carers, existing Foster Carers when identified as part of the Personal Development plan, Family and Friends Foster Carers.

What's it about?

This course will look at an often unacknowledged part of caring for and working with children and young people with traumatic histories - the way in which those histories can begin to have a traumatic impact on ourselves as Carers, parents and workers. When you begin to feel lost, confused, chaotic or angry, are they your emotions or the child's expressed through you?

What Will I Learn?

- We will look at ways to spot when this is happening in yourself and others.
- An understanding of what is happening.
- Ways to manage and protect yourself against those effects.

Understanding Eating Disorders

Who is it for?

Foster carers, Family & Friends Carers, Special Guardians & Adopters

What's it about?

The purpose of this session is to give all learners an awareness of Eating Disorders in young people and the importance of recognising the early warning signs. It includes the condition ARFID which is common amongst children and young people who have a difficult relationship with food.

What will I learn?

- Identified various types of eating disorders and explored some potential causes.
- Discussed what influence the media has on body image of both boys and girls.
- Explored what factors contribute to the thoughts and feeling present in young people who use self harming behaviours.
- Explored the condition Avoidant Restrictive Food Intake Disorder (ARFID)
- Identified the potential co existing disorders that may be present alongside eating disorders
- Discussed what we can do to support young people with emotional trauma and body dysmorphia.
- Explored local and national resources that support Young People & Families
- Reflected on own practice.

Understanding Executive Functioning

Who's it for?

What's it about?

Executive function and self-regulation skills are the mental processes that enable us to plan, focus our attention, remember instructions, and juggle multiple tasks successfully. It's a key life skill that will offer better life chances to those who master it. It's also part of the wiring of the brain that is effected by Trauma and a large amount of the LAC population struggle with their executive functioning. The good news is that you can teach 'executive functioning skills' to children / young people.

What will I learn?

This course will look at the impact and just what we can do to help our young people.

Understanding Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD)

Who is it for?

Foster carers, Family & Friends Carers, Special Guardians & Adopters.

What's it about?

The purpose of this session is to give all learners an understanding of the neurological condition Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD) in particular how it relates to children and young people. It discusses the importance of recognising the early warning signs by exploring potential causes and explores ways in which the anxious child can be supported to reduce the need to regulate strong negative emotions in this way.

What will I learn?

By the end of this session learners will have:

Stated the DSM-5-TR diagnostic criteria for Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD).

Identified potential causes for this extreme anxiety based condition.

Explored some of the general signs and symptoms that can be present in someone with OCD


Explored what factors contribute to the thoughts and feeling present in children and young people with OCD.
